The church was founded by Rev. Junius Gray in 1899 and was named the Right Independent Freewill Baptist Church. It had its beginnings in the basement of a house on Russell Terrace, with fewer than twenty members. In 1901, the church purchased and moved to a two-story building at 1102 Parrish Alley. The very next year the adjoining property was bought, and a new church building was constructed. Later, in 1911, the church was renamed Psalmist Baptist Church, purchased, and remodeled property at Riggs Avenue and Woodyear Street. Rev. Gray was an active community leader and the church donated \$100 towards salaries of Negro Nurses in segregated colored schools. Rev. Junius Gray pastored Psalmist Baptist Church for 47 years.

Rev. F.C. Atkins was called to pastor Psalmist Baptist Church in June 1948. Under his leadership, Psalmist membership greatly increased. Due to congregational growth, the church purchased and moved to a new building at Druid Hill and North Avenues in 1954. During Rev. Atkins' pastorate, many improvements were made to the interior, including installation of a baptismal pool, powder room for the ladies and air conditioning. A new pipe organ and hot water heater were also purchased. The \$56,000 mortgage was paid in full and burned in 1960. The church was renamed, the New Psalmist Baptist Church. Rev. Atkins was an excellent preacher. He labored diligently in service for God until his sudden passing on March 16, 1974.



Bishop Walter S. Thomas was called to pastor this church in April of 1975. Under his stewardship, in 1978, New Psalmist moved from Druid Hill and North Avenues to Cathedral and Franklin Streets. While in downtown Baltimore, New Psalmist grew tremendously. In 1991, a church meeting was held, and a motion was passed to build a new church. In 1994, New Psalmist broke ground and two years later, April 7, 1996, New Psalmist moved from Franklin and Cathedral Street to 45011/2 Old Frederick Road; a multi-million-dollar worship center and ministry complex on 19 acres of land. The church continued to grow and in 2004 another church meeting was held to build a new church. In 2008, the church broke ground. In the fall of 2010, the church moved into its brand new 4000-seat worship facility. To God Be the Glory!

New Psalmist is very fertile growing ground. There are Bible Study classes held every day of the week, a three-year discipleship program, leadership classes, a catering ministry, and a ministry school for future ministers of the gospel, just to name a few. New Psalmist has a televised broadcast, "Empowering Disciples" that can be viewed locally and a regular Wednesday noon-day worship service. Many men and women have left New Psalmist Baptist Church to pastor other churches. In 2005, they came together to form The Kingdom Association of Covenant Pastors and elected Bishop Thomas as the Presiding Prelate of the organization. On July 20, 2005, Bishop Thomas was elevated to the office of Bishop and Presiding Prelate of The Kingdom Association of Covenant Pastors. This historical occasion was held at the First Mariner Arena in front of over 10,000 people. New Psalmist was proud to witness such a historic day in the life of its Pastor.

New Psalmist believes in caring for its community and God's creation.

Our mission is to make life better for someone else. Partnerships have been formed with local schools and nursing homes to help students and seniors, as well as support teachers and the administration of the schools and nursing homes. A food pantry has been set up in the church for those needing food at any time. Families are also helped during the Thanksgiving and Christmas season. New Psalmist is always striving to be of service to those in need.

Bishop Thomas has led New Psalmist to higher heights and deeper depths in Christ. Under his leadership the church has grown from 200 to over 8,000 active members.

In March of 2020, the world shut down due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On Thursday March 12th, New Psalmist made the unprecedented decision to close its doors and conduct ministry solely online, virtually. Sunday March 15th was Bishop Thomas's 45th Pastoral Anniversary and he preached to an empty sanctuary. In the weeks that followed all services were held online, with Bishop preaching from his home and Lady Thomas acting as producer. The music ministry developed a virtual choir to minister every week in service. Virtual children's church and youth church was held every week for the younger members of our congregation. It was a trying time.

We could not come together as a church family, but we were held together by our faith in God and the leadership of our church.

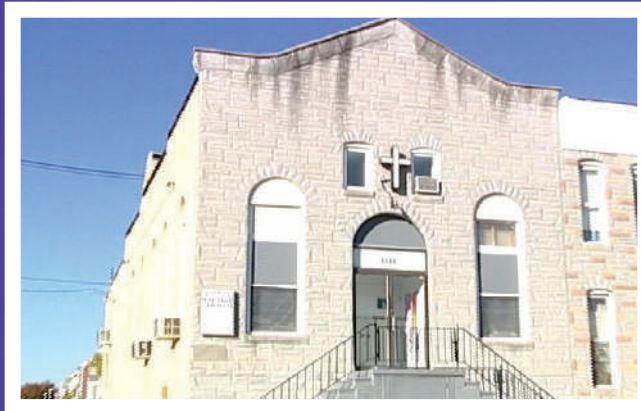
Bishop Thomas preached every Sunday for 52 weeks and taught every Bible Study. Many members passed and we were unable to mourn their loss. However, we kept the faith and believed that God would see us through. On Sunday July 11th, 2021, after 15 months of being out of the building, New Psalmist opened the

physical doors of the church and began worshipping in person again with one service at 9 am. Covid may have changed how we worship and live our lives for the foreseeable future, but it did not change our faith in God!

In May of 2023, Bishop Thomas notified the official board of his intent to begin his journey towards retirement. During this time, he gave his recommendation for the next Pastor to the official board and a pulpit committee was formed. Once the pulpit committee completed its due diligence, they reported back to the church in an official church meeting. A motion was made, and the vote was unanimous to elect Dr. Walter S. Thomas, Jr., as the 4th Pastor of New Psalmist Baptist Church. He began pastoring in November of 2023 and was installed as Pastor on May 4, 2024. During this time of transition Bishop Thomas and Dr. Thomas are leading us to new heights. For eyes have not seen, neither have ears heard what great things are in store for New Psalmist Baptist Church.



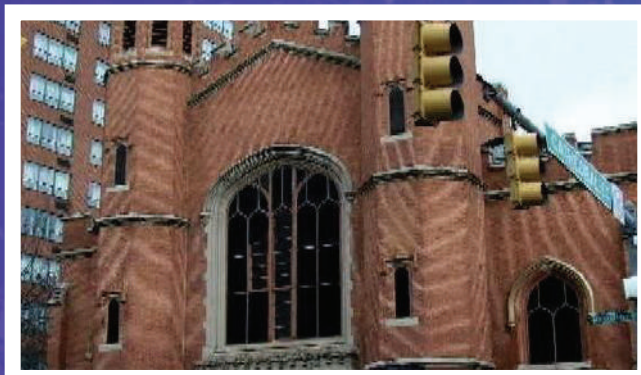

Riggs and Woodyear



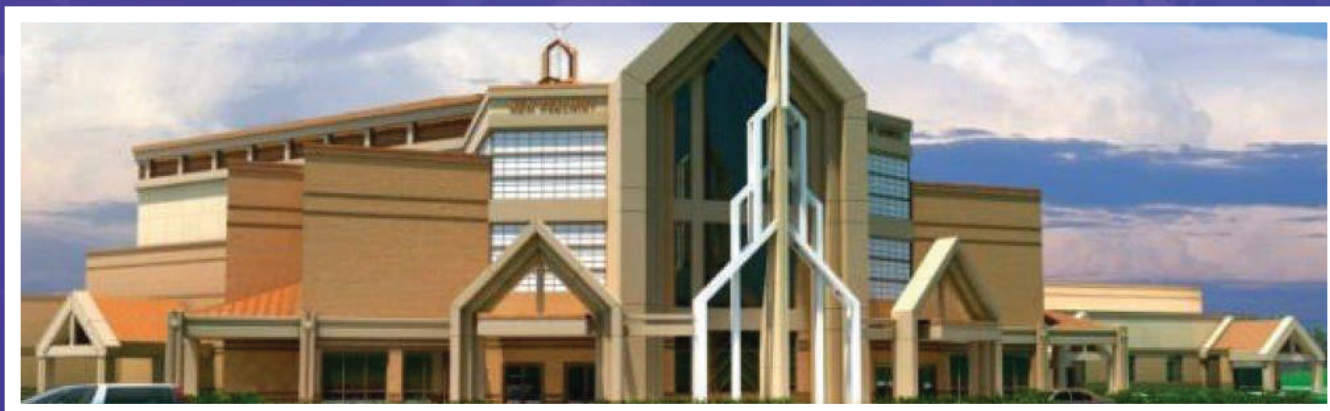
Druid Hill and North Ave

Church organized in 1899 under the name, Right Independent Freewill Baptist (R.I.F.B.) with worship services held in the basement of 1015 Russell Terrace.

In 1901, the church purchased and moved to a two-story building at 1101 Parrish Alley. The purchase price was \$5,000. In 1902, the adjoining property was bought and a new church building was constructed. Later, the church name changed to Psalmist Baptist Church. In 1911, the church purchased and remodeled property at Riggs Avenue and Woodyear Street. As an active community leader, the church donated \$100 towards the salaries of Negro Nurses in segregated colored schools.

Rev. Junius Gray was the pastor of Psalmist Baptist Church for 47 years. In 1908 he married Miss Fannie Robinson. One of his favorite statements was "that we should not forget the rock from which we were hewn or the pit from which we were dug." In addition to his ministerial duties, Rev. Gray was actively involved in civic and community activities. A partial list follows:

- Organized a prayer service for the Workshop for the Blind
- Appointed Chairman of the Evangelistic Campaign of Southern Baptist Convention
- President of the Colored Minister's Conference (as it was then known) for two years
- President of the Baptist Minister's Conference for three years
- Provided the first \$100 toward paying the salary of African American nurses in the then colored schools
- Chairman of committee entertaining the National Baptist Convention
- First African-American preacher to drive an automobile in Baltimore City
- First African-American to preach at the National Baptist Convention in 1928

Due to congregational growth, the church purchased and moved to a new building at Druid Hill and North Avenues in 1954. The \$56,000 mortgage was paid in full and burned in 1960.

The church was renamed, the New Psalmist Baptist Church. Frederick Atkins was born on October 12, 1894 in Prince County, Virginia. He accepted Christ at an early age. He received his public education in New Jersey, then enrolled in Ryder College in Trenton, New Jersey. After his college studies, he attended The Theological Seminary in Trenton, New Jersey.

In 1911, he was married to Anna White and from this union, five children were born. On July 6, 1915, he was licensed as a minister and was officially ordained on July 23, 1916. He was the minister of Hopewell Baptist Church in Hartford and Connecticut and New Hope Baptist Church in Suffield, Connecticut. Later marriages included Rachel Hatcher and Delloth Albert. Both preceded him in death.

Rev. Atkins was called to pastor New Psalmist Baptist Church in June 1948. Under leadership, Psalmist membership greatly increased and soon the congregation outgrew the building.

In 1954, the church building at the corner of Druid Hill and North Avenues was purchased. During Rev. Atkins' pastorate, many improvements were made to interior, including installation of a baptismal pool, powder room for the ladies and air conditioning. A new pipe organ and hot water heater were also purchased.

On November 20, 1960, Rev. Atkins worked to make the church a comfortable, attractive place to worship and to teach the Word. He loved to sing as he led communion: "I Am Thine, O Lord, I have Heard Thy Voice." Rev. Atkins was excellent preacher who was quiet, humble and loved. He labored diligently in service for God until his sudden passing on March 16, 1974.

Bishop Walter Scott Thomas, Sr. has served as the pastor of the New Psalmist Baptist Church in Baltimore, Maryland since 1975. Under his leadership, the church body has grown from 200 to more than 7,000 active members.

On October 16, 2010, a vision was fulfilled as the New Psalmist family moved into their new edifice, 4000-seat state-of-the-art facility, designed to minister to the needs of individuals in the 21st century. This new church home is a testimony of God's faithfulness.

Under the anointed leadership of the late Dr. Harold Carter, Pastor of the New Shiloh Baptist Church in Baltimore, Bishop Thomas was called to proclaim the Word of God in 1973. In 1975, he was called to the pastorate of the New Psalmist Baptist Church in Baltimore, Maryland, where he has labored for over forty-nine years.

Bishop Thomas has developed programs of evangelism, mission, and education. Christian education classes that include discipleship training and Bible Study meet six days a week. Worship services are held weekly, every Sunday at 9 am. The church also has a broadcast, "Empowering Disciples", Sunday morning at 6 am on WJZ TV in Baltimore.

Bishop Walter S. Thomas, Sr. is a highly regarded executive and personal coach with over 30 years of experience in working with church leaders, pastors, church staffs, and building effective ministry teams. Bishop Thomas is a Myers Briggs Practitioner certified in MBTI assessments and interpretations. He has led workshops and seminars across the country on preparing leaders for their next level. He has served as an advisor to leaders who were seeking to make changes in their organizations and has helped them develop strategies to be successful in their efforts. His warm and affable spirit is matched by his ability to ask deep probing questions that enable his clients to see directions they might take.

Bishop Thomas is known as a Pastor's Pastor. He truly has a Pastor's heart and makes himself available as a mentor and source of strength for other Pastors. On January 31, 2005, at the New Psalmist Baptist Church, 28 sons and daughters of the Church, who Pastor churches across the nation gathered and voted unanimously to elect Bishop Thomas as President of Kingdom Association of Covenant Pastors as well as to the office of Bishop. On July 20, 2005, Bishop Thomas was elevated to the office of Bishop and Presiding Prelate of The Kingdom Association of Covenant Pastors. This historical occasion was held at the First Mariner Arena in front of over 10,000 people. The Kingdom Association of Covenant Pastors is an established association consisting of men and women who have been influenced by the ministry of New Psalmist Baptist Church and Bishop Thomas.

In addition to providing pastoral leadership to the New Psalmist Baptist Church, Bishop Thomas has served as the past president of the Hampton University Minister's Conference 1999-2002. Under his leadership, conference attendance doubled. Bishop Thomas is also a well-known author. He is author of the books *Spiritual Navigation for the 21st Century* and *Good Meat Makes its Own Gravy*. Furthermore, Bishop Thomas is the editor of *Outstanding Black Sermons Volume 4* in which he is featured as one of the contributors.

On March 1, 2017, Bishop Thomas released his highly anticipated fourth book, *Hanging on By a Thread*. A personal account of Bishop Thomas' own struggles with leadership and trying to juggle work and home life, *Hanging on By a Thread* unveils the THREAD Principle. Developed by Bishop Thomas himself, the principle outlines practical steps to restore balance to people's lives.

Bishop Thomas received his Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Maryland in Economics. He earned his Master of Divinity degree from the Howard University School of Religion in Washington, D.C., and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Saint Mary's Seminary & University in Baltimore, Maryland. In addition to his earned degrees, Bishop Thomas was bestowed with an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Virginia Seminary and Bethune Cookman College. Bishop Thomas and his committed partner in ministry, Patricia, have three lovely children, Joi, Walter Jr., and Joshua.
